Summary of School Sports Premium linked to School Development Plan

Objectives 2018/19:

- To produce showcase events that celebrate pupils' achievements
- To increase participation in extra-curricular clubs and widen the range of sporting activities provided by the school
- To involve Year 5 & 6 'Sports Crew' in planning and delivering Pashley Infant Sports Day and intra school activities/events.
- To increase activity levels at break times and lunchtimes
- To receive support and advice from a qualified PE teacher and attend all competitions organised by him.
- To provide support for NQTs and broaden knowledge and skills of all teachers in planning, teaching and assessing the National Curriculum 2014
- To continue to participate in inter-school competitions and tournaments
- To allow sharing of good practice. To enable networking with primary schools in the local area
- To ensure all children leave Ocklynge School meeting the National Curriculum requirements

We continue to be part of an academy status for the South Downs Learning Trust. Strong links have been forged with our partner school at Ratton.

PE coordinators worked with the PE association to organize and run Eastbourne's first primary dance festival which was a huge success with over 200 pupils taking part from 10 different primary schools.

Sustainability of spending

Pupil premium money is used to support children to attend after-school sports clubs free of charge. Revenue from charging for extra-curricular clubs also helps support the spending in PE and sport. Hire for venues, such as the Sovereign centre, is offset by charging parents entry to events.

Training received in gymnastics for all class teachers has increased knowledge and confidence in this area. Alongside training received by sports coaches and regular monitoring by PE coordinators has ensured there has been an increase in confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff delivering the PE curriculum.

Further, the long term 5 year strategic financial plan, includes prioritising PE and sport with our curriculum spend. PE and sport at Ocklynge are a real strength and the SLT and Governors are keen that PE provision as well as extra-curricular provision remains outstanding. This includes commitment to inter and intra school competitions. (see index 1 below)
